Listen – can you hear it? It's the sound of a saw. Where is it coming from? It's coming from "Brent's Room". Brent's Room? – What's that and Who is Brent?

Brent Boudreau first came to the Dartmouth Players back in 1993 during our production of *Lettice and Lovage*. He is one of those behind the scenes people who the audience only sees through the many wonderful sets he helps to create and build.



At any given time you can find Brent in a back room of the theatre working away on building set pieces, or coming up with some creative solution to a particular problem that we may have. Because Brent has pretty much taken over this back room, and transformed it from a janitor's closet into a well-organized workspace, it is now lovingly referred to by all of us at the theatre as "Brent's Room".

During the 11 years that he has been a part of the Dartmouth Players and the many shows that he has been a part of, his favorites include *Oh What a Lovely War*, *Little Shop of Horrors*; and *Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*.

Brent was born in Sydney, Nova Scotia – yes bye, he is a good old Cape Bretoner – and he comes with all the wonderful traits Cape Bretoners possess. Besides his parents, he has two brothers and a sister whose lives he is very much an important part of.

Outside of the theatre, Brent's other interests include cooking (he's really, really good too); playing golf; taking trips (mostly to play golf); music; reading; making gadgets; and, fixing things around the house. And if you want to know where the best buys in town are, just ask Brent. During the day Brent works with Maxim Analytics as an Environmental Technologist.

The value Brent brings to the Dartmouth Players is immeasurable – not just in all that he does for the theatre, but more importantly, in who he is as a person. 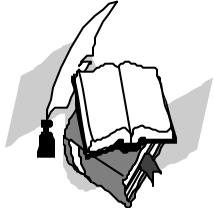

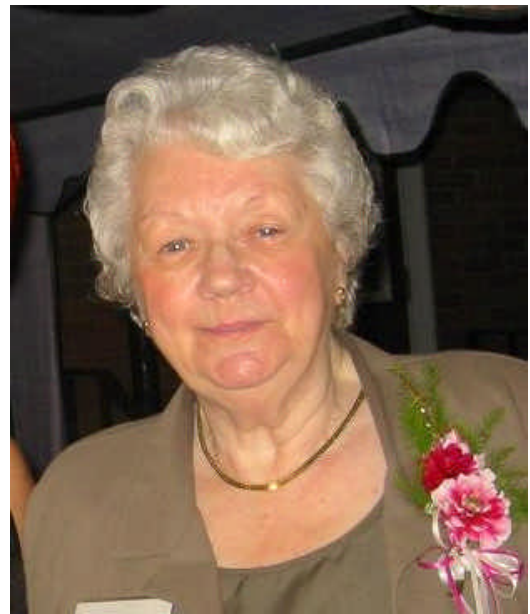

Award Winning Play *MILDRED*

Author/Director

Flo Trillo was born in British Columbia almost 80 years ago, came to Nova Scotia as a child, and by the age of six was already acting in church plays. In 1943, she moved to Ontario with her parents, and lived there until 1968 when she moved back to Nova Scotia and joined the Drama group that would become Dartmouth Players. Over the past 36 years, Flo has been involved in every aspect of theatre - working backstage, acting, producing, directing, she has done it all. When asked how many plays she has directed, and in how many she has performed, she declared them far too numerous to recall.

Flo has been professionally trained as a Director and in 1993 received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Cultural Federation of Nova Scotia for her work in Community Theatre. The last play in which Flo appeared on-stage was *The Shadow Box* in 1999. The last full length play she directed was *The Cemetery Club* in the spring of 2002 - which was supposed to be her "swan song". However, in 2003 she returned to direct the one-act season opener, *Daddy's Home*. And fortunately for all, Flo returned to Dartmouth Players once again to direct **Mildred**, a true labor of love for her.

Never one to sit still, Flo also serves as Treasurer on the Board of The Crichton Community Center Society, which oversees the building in which the theatre is housed. Flo Trillo, an incomparable lady who continues to touch the hearts of everyone she meets.

President's Award

For the past 65 years, the Ottawa Little Theatre (OLT) has sponsored an Annual National Playwriting Competition for Original One-Act Plays open to both professional and amateur writers. The First Prize, \$1000 cash and a personalized Silver Medal from Birk's Jewellers, is awarded to the most outstanding play submitted to the Competition each year. The medal is specially designed and donated annually by Henry Birks and Sons of Canada Ltd. and is retained by each recipient.

While Flo Trillo has written about 15 plays, 3 have placed in the top 4 of this competition including Honorable Mention for *Wagging Their Tails Behind Them* (1968); *Knight of the Day* (1970), and *Among His Peers* (1977). In 2003, Flo won first prize, the President's Award, for her original work, ***Mildred***, a play that was first conceived in her creative mind 10 years ago.

Although she had already received the cash part of the award, Flo had never received her medal. The OLT was contacted mid July to see if the medal could be ready for presentation on September 9. Finally at the end of August, I had the Birks Silver Metal in hand and was honored to present it to Flo at the Premiere Performance of ***Mildred***.

On September 9, 2004, Dartmouth Players presented the World Premiere of the award winning one-act play, ***Mildred***, written and directed by Flo Trillo.

Patrons and guests were greeted by the sounds of a traditional Nova Scotia Bagpiper who piped them along the red carpet and into the theatre. A reception featuring wine, cheese, fruit and other delectable bites was held before the presentation of the Play. As theatre goes mingled and chatted it was not unusual to hear glowing comments about Dartmouth Players, even to the extent of favourable comparisons to Neptune Theatre.

Invited to their seats by the ringing of a bell, the audience then was treated to a formal introduction of the playwright by Frances Taggart who gave a brief review of Flo's theatre background and presented her with a bouquet of red roses. Following this, Joyce Dagnall presented Flo with the Birk's Silver Medal on behalf of the Ottawa Little Theatre.

After a few brief words from Flo, the lights went down and the premiere performance of ***Mildred*** began. At the conclusion, the audience gave a standing ovation and thunderous applause for the presentation. Coffee and sweets were served as the audience was able to meet and chat with Flo Trillo and the cast and crew of this wonderful Play. It was a memorable evening - for everyone involved, and for those fortunate enough to be in the audience.
